# A Guide to Using How to Do Your Own Divorce in Indiana, for Residents of St. Joseph County

Since rules and procedures are a little different in each county, this guide was written to help the St. Joe County resident proceed through the steps discussed in How to do Your Own Divorce in Indiana.
